

Vivienne Barston's life has fallen apart.

With her mother recently dead, her father disappears into his grief – leaving Viv to deal with her sadness and anger alone. Viv turns to destructive behaviors like petty vandalism, but after a disturbing stint in a juvenile detention center frightens her, Viv agrees to a court mandated service opportunity designed to expunge her record. The deal: work for six weeks with a trail conservation crew in the rural woods of southern Oregon, and she'll be free with a clean slate. She knows it's her last chance.

When Viv arrives at the small town of Hard Luck, Oregon, she meets her motley crewmates, all with troubles of their own. The unusual group travels to Grafton Stake, a remote and derelict former asylum with a haunted history–and now Viv must face the ghosts of the past while fighting for her future.

INSPIRATION FOR FALSE HAVEN

Starvation Heights & Northern State Hospital

As a person with a disability (deaf / HoH), I often can't help but wonder what would have happened to me if I had been born in a different era. I wrote *False Haven* after I learned about the horrific abuses and neglect that occurred in historic medical institutions. While Grafton Stake within the novel is not a real place, and the scenes in this novel are fantastical, some of them draw inspiration from very real historical events and locations: Starvation Heights and Northern State Hospital, both in Washington State.

Starvation Heights is the common nickname for a twentieth century rest home run by an abusive doctor named Linda Hazzard, who used dubious and outright harmful methods on several clients, the most common technique being starvation under the guise of improved health.

The other location that inspired *False Haven* is The Northern State Hospital in Sedro-Woolley, Washington State. This abandoned psychiatric facility contains a graveyard with over a thousand burials – and no names. Only a few have initials or numbers. Shrouded in secrecy for decades, the records of patient deaths finally became available in 2023.

Given the horrendous reports of abuse, neglect, and the erasure of patient records, these haunted locales lent themselves very easily to the horror genre and to my story specifically.
